### DCEC Makes Capital Credit Distribution

About 2,400 DCEC members who received electric service from the Cooperative in 1989 received a capital credit retirement in December. DCEC operates on a non-profit basis. When the Cooperative has a positive financial margin at the end of the year, it is allocated to members and paid back when financial conditions permit.

One of the goals of the DCEC Board of Directors is to retire capital credits annually to the members. The retirement amounted to \$466,000 which was the remaining balance of the 1989 credits. Members from 1989 who are still active with DCEC received the retirement as a credit on their December electric bills while check payments were issued to members that are no longer receiving electric service from DCEC.



### Tips On Preparing For An Outage

1. Have fresh batteries for a flashlight, radio, and alarm clock.
2. Have a manual can opener, drinking water, and dry food available.
3. Keep a non-electrical corded phone or cell phone available with emergency numbers. If you are experiencing a medical emergency please call 911.
4. Protect your appliances, computers and other sensitive equipment with a surge protector.
5. If you have a generator, make sure that it is properly connected to isolate the generator from the possibility of feeding back into DCEC's electric lines. If you have any questions, please contact DCEC's office for consultation. Also, have enough gas on hand to run the generator for at least a few days.
6. Know how to use the manual override on your electric garage door opener.

### Rate Structure Revisions Proposed to Take Effect April 2016

Your board of directors is proposing rate structure revisions for all rate classifications that would take effect on your April 2016 bills, if the rate revisions are approved. Please refer to the time table below for an anticipated timeline.

Although the Cooperative has not completed a cost of service study since 2011, the Cooperative has been utilizing a Formulary Rate Adjustment to make small adjustments to rates every six months in order to keep revenues in line with costs. Therefore, the rate structure revisions being proposed for April of 2016 are revenue neutral. The proposed revisions to the Cooperative's rate structures do not change the total revenue that the Cooperative will receive from members, but they do change the amounts members will pay on each line of their bill. The average Formulary Rate Adjustment (FRA) and the average Power Cost Adjustment (PCA) lines during the first year after the rate revisions should be zero. In some months the PCA could be a charge and in other months the PCA could be a credit, but it should average zero for the year.

In the example above, this Residential SC-1 member paid very close to the same amount for the total bill, but costs were shifted from variable Power Cost Adjustment and Formulary Rate Adjustment charges to the basic energy charge and the fixed monthly service charge. This rate revision “zeros out” the Power Cost Adjustment and Formulary Rate Adjustment lines. This is one goal of the rate structure revision. Another goal of the rate structure revision is to have each rate classification pay as close as possible to the amount that it costs to serve them. Therefore, some rate classifications will pay slightly more (up to ~3.5% more) after the rate structure revision and some rate classifications will pay slightly less (up to ~5%).

## What You Should Know About Downed Power Lines

Always remember to stay clear of fallen utility wires. If you do come in contact with a downed utility wire of any kind, always do the following:

1. Assume it's energized and stay as far away as you can. Energized lines can charge the ground near the point of contact and may electrocute you. If a person or pet comes into contact with a downed power line, remain clear. Do not touch them or the wire.
2. Call 911 or the utility serving the location. Leave everything to utility professionals and emergency personnel.
3. Do not drive over downed power lines. Even if they're not energized, downed wires can get entangled with your vehicle and cause further damage.
4. Stay in your car. If a power line falls on your vehicle while you're driving, do not exit until you know for sure that the line is de-energized.
5. If you must evacuate, jump away and land with both feet together. Do not touch the vehicle while stepping on the ground, as this can create a path for electricity to run through you.
6. Shuffle away to safety. Keep your feet together and take small, shuffling steps until you're at least 35 feet away. Taking larger steps can also create a path for electricity to run through you.
7. Phone and television wires can be just as dangerous as electric wires. Treat all downed wires as shock hazards.

### Shifting Member Costs from Variable to Fixed

The Cooperative is shifting member costs slowly from variable energy-based charges to fixed monthly service charges. There are a number of reasons for this shift:

1. The Cooperative does not cover enough of its fixed costs through fixed revenues. Therefore, the Cooperative experiences large revenue swings due to unpredictable winter weather patterns. Unseasonably warm winter weather leads to a revenue shortfall while extraordinarily cold winter temperatures lead to higher than expected revenues.

2. Energy conservation measures, which should be supported, promoted, and celebrated by the Cooperative, make it difficult for the Cooperative to recover the cost to serve its members.

There are fixed costs to make electrical service available to members, regardless of how much energy an individual consumes. By shifting member costs from variable to fixed, the Cooperative can recover more of its fixed costs AND work together with members to reduce energy consumption.

## Spotlight on Sportsfield

Sportsfield Specialties, Inc. is a large commercial member of your Cooperative. Since 1998, Sportsfield has been the innovative industry leader in the manufacture and sale of sports construction equipment for the high school, college and professional levels of competition in the Eastern US. They now have a growing market share in the Western, Southern, and Mountain regions of the US also. You have probably seen some of Sportsfield's products on television if you have seen an NFL goal post or the protective netting and padding surrounding a professional baseball field.

Sportsfield is not only a valued member of the Cooperative, but a valued employer in Delaware County. They recently invested \$8 million to expand their

manufacturing facility outside of Delhi. By adding 57,000 square feet to their manufacturing floor, Sportsfield will also create 37 new full time jobs for local people. Sportsfield already has approximately 68 employees in Delhi.

By investing in their business and creating new jobs, Sportsfield helps the Cooperative to purchase more low-cost, renewable hydro energy through the New York Power Authority's (NYPA's) Economic Development Power (EDP) program. The Cooperative's latest application for up to 250 kW of additional EDP power was approved at the December meeting of the NYPA Trustees. These allocations of low-cost economic development power help to keep rates affordable for all members of the Cooperative.

## Greene Lumber Project

DCEC and NYSEG have executed an Facilities Agreement (“Agreement”) which calls for DCEC to upgrade a portion of its electric distribution system in order to provide capacity for an interconnection with NYSEG for providing electric service to the Greene Lumber development in the vicinity of Butts Corners, Davenport, NY. The Agreement calls for DCEC to provide 1.5 MW of capacity on its electric distribution system for the interconnection.

DCEC has completed the planning and design for the identified system upgrades and has begun to order the required equipment and hardware.

## 2016 Board of Director Nominations & Nominating Committee

*As a democratic organization, Cooperative members vote each year to elect directors to represent them on the DCEC Board. Elections for director positions occur at the DCEC’s Annual Meeting in September. DCEC currently has 7 directors representing three regions of the DCEC’s service territory (see DCEC Board Regions chart below). Directors serve 3-year terms. In accordance with the DCEC bylaws, a Nominating Committee considers members interested in serving on the board and nominates candidates for the election. If you are a bona-fide residential member of the Cooperative, at least 21 years old and are interested in being a candidate, or if you would like additional information, please contact the DCEC office.*

In accordance with DCEC bylaws, the Nominating Committee must prepare a list of candidates for membership consideration at least 60 days prior to the Cooperative’s Annual Meeting. The 2016 Annual Meeting of the Members is scheduled to be held **September 23, 2016 at 4:30 p.m.**

Elections will occur at the 2016 Annual Meeting for two board seats representing the Central Region, which are currently served by Meg Hungerford and Steve Oles.

The Central Region consists of the Towns of Bovina, Delhi, Franklin, Hamden, Kortright, and Meredith.

The Committee will meet from March through June at the DCEC office at 39 Elm Street, Delhi, for the purpose of identifying candidates for the above positions.

Nominations for directors are governed by Article 4 of the Bylaws. A director may be nominated either through:

- 1) The **NOMINATING COMMITTEE**. The Nominating Committee meets to identify at least two candidates to run for each seat up for election.
- 2) The second way is by **PETITION**. Any 15 or more members may petition the Cooperative to place a qualified member on the ballot. This must be done at least 45 days before the Annual Meeting.

Rules regulating director elections are outlined in DCEC’s bylaws which are available on: [www.dce.coop/content/dcec-bylaws-policies](http://www.dce.coop/content/dcec-bylaws-policies). Voting for directors is covered by Article 3. Each member may cast one ballot for a nominee for each seat up for election. ***A married couple holding a joint membership are considered one member and will receive one ballot.***

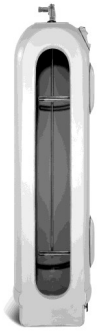

7. Be sure to keep at least a half tank of gas in your vehicle.
8. Keep your refrigerator and freezer closed as much as possible. A well insulated freezer will keep your food from spoiling for days, depending on its location, as long as you don't open the door.
9. If you hear that a storm is coming, fill your bathtub with water for use in flushing toilets, feeding pets and for other non drinking purposes.
10. Never use gas ovens, gas ranges, or barbeque grills for indoor heating.
11. Make sure you have new batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

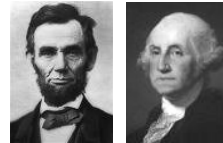
