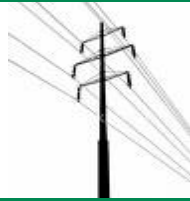

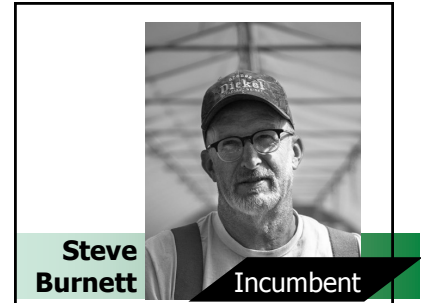

2019 Official Candidates

Each member shall be entitled to cast only one ballot. All questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by absentee ballot. Questions resulting in a tie vote shall be decided by a second round of voting in like manner. If a second round of voting results in a tie, the question shall be decided by a flipping of a coin, which shall be administered by a duly elected officer of the Cooperative. During the Annual Meeting, or by absentee ballot, eligible voters can vote for two (2) nominees from the Central Region. Below, is a list of candidates up for election. Please be aware that the members can vote for the Central Region even if they do not reside in that Region.

Steve Burnett has been a member of DCEC since 1989. He and his family have a farm in Bovina. It's an organic, sustainable operation that has fruits/berries, vegetables, animals, maple syrup and honey. Mr. Burnett's career was in marketing and design. Vote by Absentee Ballot

If you are not planning to attend the 2019 DCEC Annual Meeting, you can still make your vote count by requesting an absentee ballot.

VOTE BY MAIL

One method for a member to be eligible to vote by absentee ballot is to request a ballot by completing an official form (available below) and submitting it to the Cooperative by **August 31, 2019**. Once the Cooperative receives your form we will provide you with an official absentee ballot which you can then complete and send back to the DCEC office. DCEC will count properly completed absentee ballots as long as they are received by **September 16, 2019** (4 business days prior to the Annual Meeting). Once DCEC has received a member's absentee ballot it cannot be revoked if the member decides to attend the Annual Meeting and vote once there.

VOTE EARLY AT THE CO-OP OFFICE

Members can also complete an absentee ballot in person at the Co-op office during regular business hours between **August 31, 2019 and September 16, 2019**. You must have a government issued photo ID with you to vote by absentee ballot in the Cooperative office.

The Delaware County Electric Cooperative (hereinafter "Cooperative") will hold its Annual Meeting on **September 20, 2019** for the transaction of all lawful business in accordance with its Bylaws and the New York State Rural Electric Cooperative Law.

The Annual Meeting will be held at the Delaware Academy Central School, located at 2 Sheldon Drive, Delhi, NY, and the business meeting shall begin at 6:30 pm.

Members who are unable to attend in person are permitted under Article III of the Cooperative's Bylaws to vote, by absentee ballot, on any and all issues presented to the general membership at that meeting.

To be eligible to vote by absentee ballot, members may request that an absentee ballot be sent to them by providing the following information and returning this completed form to the Cooperative. ***The Cooperative must receive this request no later than August 31, 2019.*** Upon receipt, the Cooperative shall send to the requesting member an absentee ballot with instructions for its completion and submission.

Summertime Safety Tips

The lazy days of summer are here. Enjoy the summertime sunshine in the outdoors with your family, but please do so wisely.

Here are some ideas that will help to protect babies and young children while they are enjoying an outing on a sunny, summer day.

Protect your baby when in the sun by avoiding being in direct sunlight between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. and stay in shaded area as much as possible when outdoors. Dress your baby in a hat, sunglasses, and clothing made with tight weave. For babies 6 months and older, use sunscreen with an SPF of at least 15 (SPF 30 and higher is even better) that offers both UVA and UVB protection. If your baby is younger than 6 months and adequate shade is not available, apply sunscreen in small amounts on exposed surfaces of the skin. Be sure to apply sunscreen at least 30 minutes prior to going outside, even on cloudy days and plan to reapply sunscreen every two hours. If your outing includes swimming, remember that sunscreen loses its effectiveness after about 80 minutes of swimming.

A recent study indicates that certain active compounds contained in some sunscreen products may be absorbed into the body and the bloodstream. Dr. Theresa Michele and Dr. David Stauss with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (“FDA”) say that people should continue using sunscreens, since they are a good way to protect skin from the sun’s harmful ultraviolet (“UV”) rays while additional data is being gathered about how these active compounds may affect users. For those that are concerned about the incomplete data with regard to the safe use of these compounds, Dr. Michele and Dr. Strauss say that there are other ways to avoid damaging sun exposure and UV rays, such as staying out of the sun during peak hours between 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and wearing protective clothing, as well as hats and sunglasses. Look for more information regarding this topic from the FDA in the future.

If your child develops a sunburn, the best remedies are cold compresses, over-the-counter pain relievers and topical preparations containing aloe.

As temperatures rise, heat exhaustion becomes a concern. Symptoms may include fatigue, extreme thirst, and muscle cramps. If the affected person doesn’t cool down and rehydrate, heat exhaustion can lead to heatstroke. Signs of heatstroke include headaches, dizziness, nausea, vomiting and lack of perspiration. Heatstroke is potentially fatal.

If you notice heat illnesses in children, spray them with cold water from a bottle or hose, fan them and move them to a shaded area. Ice packs applied to the groin and armpit areas can speed up the cooling process even more. If you suspect heatstroke, call 911 for help.

Infants are vulnerable to heat-related illness, so keep them in air-conditioned areas when possible. Never leave children in unattended cars, even with the windows cracked open.

Summertime fun for children often includes play time in the water. Exercise caution when children are in the water. Sadly, drowning is among the leading causes of accidental death in children. If your children are playing in the water, supervise them within an arm’s length reach, even in shallow water. It’s recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics that parents should not enroll children under the age of 4 in formal swimming lessons that teach water survival skills.

When choosing a flotation device for children, select a child-size life vest. Life vests are likely to provide more effective protection for your children than water wings or a swimming ring. Also, consider taking a CPR course so that you’ll be prepared in case of a near-drowning incident. You can find out more about this from your local American Red Cross chapter at redcross.org.

Protect your children against accidental burns. About half of all accidental burns that occur each year happen to children under the age of 4. Therefore, you should not leave a small child unattended around hot appliances, such as a grill or a stove and you should keep children at a distance while you are cooking. Additionally, while they may be fun on a summertime evening, it’s best to keep children away from sparklers and other fireworks.

DCEC Makes 2018 Capital Credit Allocation

Capital credits are the retained margins left over at the end of the year for not for profit utilities, such as your member-owned Delaware County Electric Cooperative. This owner equity is an essential part in maintaining good financial health by reducing DCEC's borrowing needs and reducing the interest rates DCEC pays to banks.

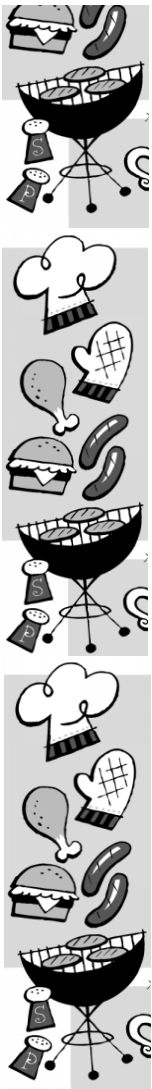
For 2018, DCEC has allocated (set aside) \$695,806.74 to members who contributed to the revenue that exceeded expenses for the year simply by paying your monthly electric bill. The allocation factor is multiplied by the amount of revenue you contributed during that year. This is your



share of the margins or your capital credit allocation. Your specific allocated amount is shown on the June and July bill print.

Each year, DCEC's Board of Directors, with the help of the Finance Committee, determine if capital credits can be returned to members. In December, 2018, DCEC paid out 1991 allocated capital credits in the amount of \$478,015.00. Thank you for being a DCEC member and for your contributions in making our Cooperative financially strong.

Summertime Safety Tips...Continued from Page 4...

If your child does suffer an accidental burn, you'll need to be able to recognize the appropriate symptoms:

First degree burns are painful and red but do not blister. To care for this type of burn, hold the area under running cool tap water for about 5 to 10 minutes. There's no need to use topical creams or ointments. Do not apply ice as this can lead to frostbite of the affected area which will delay healing. Place a loose, sterile dressing over the site and keep it clean with soap and water as it heals.

Second degree burns are deeper and typically blister. Do not pop these blister bubbles. Contact your child's doctor or healthcare provider if you notice these conditions.

Third degree burns are the most serious. These may appear white, waxy or black. They may be so deep that the affected area feels numb. Such burns require immediate medical attention.

To help prevent insect bites when outside, cover children with lightweight clothing and use mosquito netting over strollers and infant seats. In our area, ticks are also a concern. Check your child's body for them at the end of each day spent in the outdoors. If you discover a tick on your child, use a device, such as a tweezer, to pull it off by its head. Ticks have to be embedded in the skin for about 24 hours to transmit pathogens which may contain diseases.

The summer season, with its related outdoor activity, is a good time to ensure that your first-aid kit is well stocked so that you are prepared if an accident should occur. Your kit should include at least the following items:

- Adhesive bandages (such as Band-Aids)
- Antibacterial gel or foam
- Triple-antibiotic ointment
- Hydrocortisone cream
- Sterile gauze pads
- Adhesive tape
- Tweezers
- Washclothes
- Cold packs
- Infant & children's Motrin or Tylenol
- Oral Antihistamine
- Rubbing alcohol
- Digital thermometer

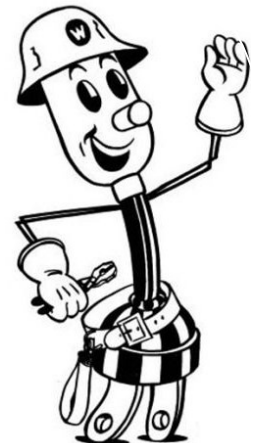
Highlights for this year's meeting include guest speaker Jennifer Kabat, The Nelson Brothers Band, and plenty of chances to win cash and door prizes!

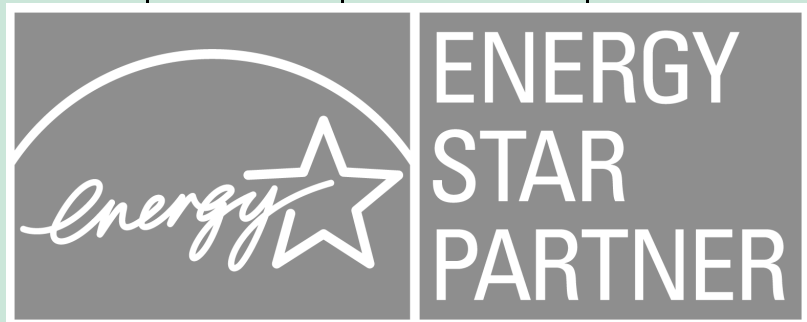

Wondering How to Dispose of that Old Appliance?

The DCEC office has received several calls in relation to the New Energy Star Rebate Program that started on May 1st. The main question that our members have is how to dispose of the old appliances. The requirements of the Rebate Program state that the old appliance must be removed from service and disposed in an environmentally responsible manner. It also states that the Cooperative may require proof of disposal. DCEC has reached out to several local transfer and waste management systems within the 4 counties that we serve, to help answer your questions. Because each county has different regulations and guidelines we encourage you to call before going to any Transfer Station. DCEC has created a table for you to reach out to your waste management system in your area to confirm Transfer Stations rate schedules and answer any additional questions you may have. Outstanding Young Farm Family Award by Ray LaFever

At the 57th annual Delaware County Dairy Princess Coronation dinner in May, members of the DCEC, Tim and Lauren Sherwood were awarded the Outstanding Young Farm Family award by the Delaware County Chamber of Commerce and the Delaware County Dairy Promotion Committee. Tim purchased his parents farm last year and operates it as Sher-Brook Organic Dairy Farm. He has operated the farm since 2007.

Tim grew up on the family farm, where he learned about the dairying business. His parents, Kathy and Randy Sherwood, came from New Jersey, and while they did not grow up on farms, his father attended agricultural school in Pennsylvania, and both became anxious to start farming. They started shopping for an inexpensive farm and ended up in Delhi on the farm now owned by their son.

The Sherwood farm is not particularly large, though they have expanded some over the years. Tim attended Ohio State University to study hog and livestock production. His wife Lauren also grew up in a farming family, visiting her grandparents farm often. Tim and Lauren met through their interest in farming. Tim worked for the Precision Feed Management Program. Lauren's uncle's farm was a part of the program. Tim would go there to weigh cows and get forage samples. Lauren

continues to help at her uncle's neighboring farm as well as on her own.

The Sherwoods have a herd of thirty-five cows, their main product being organic milk. They also sell some hay and silage. Going organic has proved to be profitable. The farm's organic status is important to Tim and Lauren. They maintain a covered feeding area for year-round out-of-the-barn feeding, a practice critical to maintaining an organic certification. Tim and Lauren are leaders of the Organic Farmer Discussion Group facilitated by the Cornell Cooperative Extension.

Tim and Lauren also are active in the Watershed Agricultural Council as participants in the council's Nutrient Management Credit and Precision Feed Management programs. Tim is a member of the agricultural committee of the Watershed Agricultural Council.

The Sherwoods have been DCEC members for many years and have always seen the Cooperative as a lifeline for them. While the new DCEC dairy rates have been greatly appreciated, Tim and Lauren also like the service they get. Tim is particularly impressed by how clear the right-of-way crews keep the vegetation around the power lines.

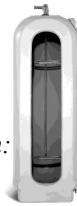
