Thank you for attending DCEC's 80th Annual Meeting!

CEO Address at the 8/24 Annual Meeting:

We have had a very eventful year since our last annual meeting, have faced many challenges, and also have many things to be excited about.

One area of excitement has been applying for state and are extremely costly in terms of manpower, supplies, and federal grants in hopes of receiving funds to help with equipment. During an outage, we ask that you check our activities focusing around increased grid resilience, as well as workforce development. DCEC has already been awarded call our automated outage reporting system to have your a \$400,000 grant for lineman training. We have submitted an application for a \$200,000 state grant for technical assistance in grid resilience, and a \$50,000 planning grant to prepare to build an electric technology training facility here in Delaware County in conjunction with our friends at SUNY Delhi. We are excited to be the lead cooperative in a consortium of six coops from NY, NJ, and PA on a \$37 million dollar grid resiliency grant proposal. We are anxiously awaiting word on these grant applications.

We have more exciting projects going on that will help us provide better service and communication with you. Our current phone system is being upgraded. The new phone system will better allow us to take your phone calls during a normal day, as well as during a storm or outage event. We continue to embrace additional ways to engage with you, including our website, newsletter, social media, and even our increased in-person events. One challenge we have is in making sure we have your correct contact information. This year, we plan to implement a new automatic contact system that can get information to you through multiple channels, but this system requires us to have your correct contact information in our database and to know your preferences for being contacted. Unfortunately, as people get rid of land line telephones, we don't always have your new preferred contact number in our system. So, please use SmartHub to check and update your phone number. And if you don't If you don't already have a UPS, or need an additional one, currently utilize SmartHub, please download the app, or or several, please visit our website at www.dce.coop and look for an upcoming newsletter article about how to give us click on "Member Information". Speaking of storms and outages. The past several months have been brutal on the power grid in this part of the state,

with at least one major storm event impacting us every month since this past December. Several of these events have required mutual aid, where we have called on neighboring utilities to send us additional linemen to help put our system back together. We've been working to provide information about Uninterruptible Power Supplies, or UPS's. These devices (we've been giving several away at our member engagement events) are basically small battery units that can give you anywhere from several minutes to several hours of emergency power during an outage. While one of these small ones won't be enough to run your refrigerator, it could power your internet router for a few hours, or give your dying cell phone a charge. With fewer people having landline phones, and such poor cell coverage in our territory, a UPS could power your internet router so you can still make WiFi calls in an outage, if your internet is still up.

With the nearly 100% kill John Gasstrom off of Ash trees in this area, the risk from falling trees in storms is extremely high.

Yes, unfortunately, the Emerald Ash Borer has already killed or will soon kill nearly every Ash tree in the area. I know some members are upset that we are proactively taking down such a large percentage of Ash trees that we come across when we are maintaining Rights-of-Way. However, both Cornell Cooperative Extension and the USDA confirm that nearly all Ash trees in the area will be dead within the next couple of years. Please watch our newsletter and social media channels for information about how you can save seeds from our remaining Ash trees now to try to save this species after this invasive beetle hopefully dies off.

Another exciting project underway is the update of our metering system. Our current metering system had served us well for many years, but utilizes an older technology that vendors are ceasing to support. Some of our recent challenges have been when meters don't send their readings to us automatically, and we have to troubleshoot and repair technology that doesn't have replacement parts readily available. This increases our time to repair the system, and in recent years has resulted in more estimated reads. With our new system, we expect very few, if any, estimated reads with more reliable technology and better communications. We apologize to those of you who have gotten estimated reads recently, or maybe still are, as we work on transitioning to the new system.
