2023 Official Candidates

During this year's meeting, members will elect three members of the Board of Directors, one from each of the three Regions. Members can still become candidates for the Board of Directors by filing a petition signed by 15 members by Monday, July 31, 2023 (Bylaws Article IV, section 3). There will be proposed Bylaw changes and a complete list will be available on DCEC's website.

Each membership shall be entitled to cast only one ballot; for example, a joint membership has one vote. All questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by absentee ballot. Questions resulting in a tie vote shall be decided by a second round of voting in like manner. If a second round of voting results in a tie, the question shall be decided by a flipping of a coin, which shall be administered by a duly elected officer of the Cooperative. During the Annual Meeting, or by absentee ballot, eligible voters can vote for one (1) candidate from each of the three Regions. Please be aware that the members can vote for any of the three Regions even if they do not reside in that Region. For example, if you live in Kortright you are considered to be in the Central Region so you may vote for one candidate from the Central Region AND one candidate from both the Southern and Northern Regions.

The Annual Meeting special edition of Catskill Hi-Line will be included with the August bills and will contain more Annual Meeting news. We hope to see you there!

NORTHERN REGION

Edward "Rusty" Pick Jr. runs a successful construction company and has been a home builder and mason for 40+ years. He is very dedicated to his friends and neighbors and has remained a pillar of the community for all of those years. .....continued During this time, he was involved in the development, design, construction and operation of numerous fossil, nuclear, renewable (wind, solar, & hydro) and distributed power generation facilities.

Upon leaving GE in 2003, Mr. Starheim moved back to the family farm to be closer to family and friends. He became active in the local community and the CEO & General Manager of the Delaware County Electric Cooperative, a position in which he served from 2003 to 2012. During this time, DCEC successfully invested in critical technology platforms and worked closely with state and county economic development officials to attract and retain industrial businesses to the area, including Amphenol Corp in Sidney.

After 8 years at DCEC, Mr. Starheim was named President & CEO of Kenergy Corp, a \$500M electric distribution cooperative serving western Kentucky. From there, he served six years as Sr. Vice-President of the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation (CFC), a \$30B financial services firm exclusively serving the nation's electric cooperatives. In his most recent role, Mr. Starheim was the President & CEO of the Delaware Electric Cooperative, a large regulated electric utility serving the majority of the State of Delaware. Mr. Starheim retired in February 2023 and returned to the area on a full-time basis.

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Mr. Starheim and his wife, Elaine (Many), have four grown children. He is active in the Stamford Chapter of Rotary International and enjoys flying airplanes and working on the family farm.

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CENTRAL REGION

David Krzyston has lived in the Delhi area for 43 years. Mr. Krzyston has taught in the electrical program at SUNY Delhi since 1990 where he currently holds the rank of professor and works closely with faculty in the Utility Operations program.

Please don't assume that a neighbor will call, they may not have the problem, and the more detail we get about who is impacted by the problem, the more insight we gain into how to correct it.

Speaking of calling us, please let us know if you currently have or are planning to purchase an **electric vehicle** or add any other large load to the DCEC system, such as converting to **electric heat** or adding large motors. Increases in your electric load may require DCEC to take action to upgrade your service and ensure you have the power needed. Sometimes, it can take many months to order, receive, and install new electrical equipment, so the further in advance you let us know about your intentions, the more prepared we can be.

Another thought to consider is backup power. A simple device called an **Uninterruptible Power Supply** (or UPS) can help keep critical devices on for several minutes to several hours in the event of power loss. This is especially critical for folks who no longer have a traditional land-line phone, and may rely on a wi-fi connected device for telephone service. A UPS can keep your wi-fi router powered up, so that you can still have internet service (and internet-based telephone) during an outage. If you have more powerhungry devices that need power for longer, a Generlink power generator may be a good choice for you. Please see <u>https://www.dce.coop/generlink</u> for more details on Generlink generators.

Finally, in the spirit of Cooperative Principle #5, *Education, Training, and Information*, I would like to invite all of you to submit your suggestions for topics you would be interested in having further information about. DCEC plans to hold some Member Events on topics of interest, where you will have the opportunity to attend meetings and ask questions about areas of importance to you. We currently plan to hold information sessions on electric vehicles, battery storage, solar power, and new electric rate structures. More details to come on signing up for these Member Events.

Official Absentee Ballot Request Form

VOTE BY MAIL: One method for a member to be eligible to vote by absentee ballot is to request a ballot by completing an official form (available below) and submitting it to the Cooperative by August 21, 2023. Once the Cooperative receives your form we will provide you with an official absentee ballot which you can then complete and send back to the DCEC office. DCEC will count properly completed absentee ballots as long as they are received by September 11, 2023 (four business days prior to the Annual Meeting). Once DCEC has received a member's absentee ballot it cannot be revoked. The member may still attend the Annual Meeting, however, will not vote there.

VOTE EARLY AT THE CO-OP OFFICE: Members can also complete an absentee ballot in person at the Co-op office during regular business hours between August 21, 2023 and September 11, 2023. You must have a government issued photo ID with you to vote by absentee ballot in the Cooperative office.

Being a member of a cooperative does have many perks. One perk of being a member of DCEC is that you — or in some cases, your estate — could potentially receive money from the Co-op. A cooperative is not an investor owned utility, it is a not-for-profit member-owned utility. This means your cooperative does not earn profits in the sense other businesses do. Instead, revenues remaining after all expenses have been paid, are returned to the members in proportion to their usage of the Co-op's services through capital credit allocations and retirements. What happens to a member's capital credits if the member moves away from the system? A member who terminates service no longer receives additional capital credit allocations. It is the member's responsibility to notify the Co-op of any changes in address or phone number so the member can be located when it is time for the Cooperative to retire capital credits allocated to the member's account.

The adjacent is a list of DCEC members whose capital credit checks have been returned to DCEC by the USPS due to an insufficient or outdated address. Reporting Outages

Members, please always report when you experience a power outage. There are some cases when a member has a single outage and we may not know unless you report the outage. Likewise, if an outage is widespread, the more members that report the outage, the more information this provides for our Line Crew to find the cause of the outage to restore power. Providing information such as where trees are down on the line or "hearing a pop" are helpful to relay to us to quickly diagnose and restore the outage.

To keep members in the know when there is an outage, we have been posting on our Facebook page and sharing to many local group pages with updates throughout the four counties we serve. We strive to get you information as it is discovered in the field so that our members know how long the outage may last for.

Asplundh Crews will continue to work on the DCEC property and will be cutting on Monroe Rd, Dry Brook Road, Turnpike Road and the end of Jersey Road.

Is <u>Your</u> Service Location Number in This Issue?

Your service location number begins with two letters and is located on your bill next to your account number. Keep your eyes peeled for the "hidden location number" in this newsletter! If

you find the number, and it is your service location, call us at (607)746-2341 and you will receive a \$10 bill credit! You must call within 60 days of publication—there are FIVE numbers in this newsletter, go and find 'em! *Good luck!*

Third Party Notification

Every member has the right to designate a third party to be notified if the member's bill is not paid and if the member's service becomes subject to disconnection for nonpayment.

For example, a parent can designate an adult child as the third party to receive notifications. Third party notifications can be very helpful in situations where health troubles or other factors might make it difficult for the member to stay on top of bill payments.
